FINDING DANIEL

Frank D. Jenkins

The paternal side of my family, The Jenkins' of Sumter and Lee counties South Carolina, held their bi-annual reunion over the 2013 Labor Day weekend. This time it was held in Hanover, Maryland. My cousin Brenda from Puerto Rico and my cousin Mary (a family sub-matriarch) of Patterson, New Jersey volunteered to be the sponsors/hosts this time. Hanover was selected because of its centralized location between New Jersey and South Carolina, the primary locations of the family.

The reunion was well attended. Over 125 family members were able to come this time. Family members were in attendance from as far away as Germany. I was able to see my cousin Dorothy who I hadn't seen for 50 plus years. We had a good time reminiscing about the "Olden Days". It was also good to see a large number of younger people there this time.

My cousin Mary (the sub-matriarch) and I discussed our ancestors and I went over the current status of our genealogy. She asked if I had found any additional information on our grand-uncle, Daniel Jenkins of Sumter, who has remained a mystery. We have been looking for traces of him or his descendants for years with no luck. We have been able to find his nine other siblings.

As schedules go, the normal reunion activities were held including a tour of Washington, DC and of course, the obligatory trip to the local mall for those so inclined. A traditional part of our reunions is to find a local church to attend as a group (with the consent of the church due to the number of people in our group). Since neither of my cousins, Brenda or Mary knew of a church in the Hanover area, they asked a friend in New Jersey if she knew of a church that was near the hotel where the family was staying. She said no, but she did know of someone in the area that could recommend one. My cousins contacted the woman and she suggested Saint Mark's United Methodist Church in Hanover, only a mile or so from the hotel.

About 40 family members attended the Sunday morning, 11 o'clock service. The members were friendly and the church atmosphere was inviting. One of our family members spoke representing the family and mentioned that we were the Jenkins Family of Sumter SC.

After the service, we were greeted by several members of the church who thanked us for coming. While Cousin Mary and I were talking to an elderly gentleman, a woman was standing off to the side, obviously waiting to speak to us. When we had finished talking with the man, the woman approached us and introduced herself and said that she sang in the church choir. She then mentioned that she was married and that her maiden name was Jenkins and that she was born in North Carolina as was her deceased father Edward Jenkins but her paternal grandfather

"Daniel Jenkins" was born in Sumter South Carolina. My cousin Mary had to be supported when she heard that. Was this possibly "our" Daniel Jenkins?

We exchanged information and talked about other possible relatives. She said her older sister had some information and that she also has a cousin that has a family bible. She said she would have her sister contact this cousin to see if we can review the bible's content. That night (about 11 pm) I got a call from Vanessa's sister. She was as excited as I was. We talked for nearly an hour and promised to keep in touch. Since then, we've spoken several times.

Some things are meant to be. From the selection of Hanover, the choice of the church, the fact that Vanessa was there that Sunday and that she chose to speak to us. Any one of those things would have resulted in a different outcome. We are still hoping that we've found "our" Daniel. With a little luck and the help of my newly found cousins, I'm looking forward to adding Daniel to our Jenkins Family Tree.

The Maryland State Archives serves as the central depository for government records of permanent value. Its collections date from Maryland's founding in 1634, and include a wealth of information pertaining to family history. These include colonial and state executive, legislative, and judicial records; county probate, land, and court records; church records; business records; state publications and reports; and special collections of private papers, maps, photographs, and newspapers. These records are stored in specifically designed humidity and temperature controlled stacks and all necessary preservation measures are conducted in the Archives' on-site conservation laboratory.

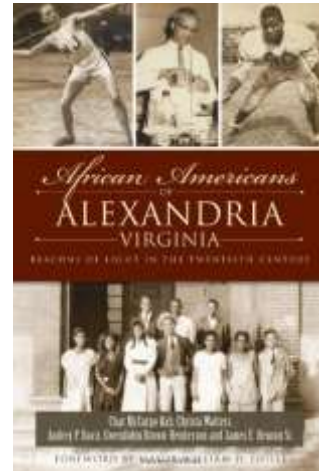

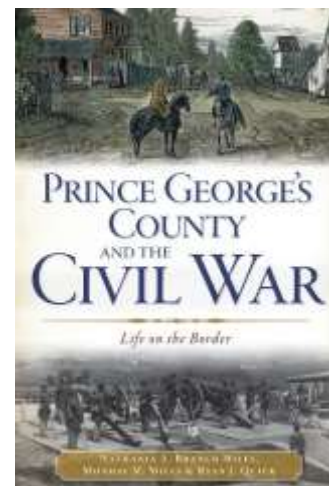

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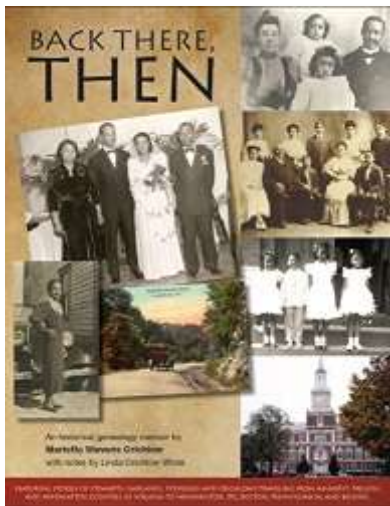
Back There, Then

Marietta and family are descended from people who were enslaved by Wilmer McLean at Appomattox Court House. It was in Wilmer McLean's home that Robert E. Lee surrendered to Ulysses S. Grant in 1865. Our ancestors were there. The stories herein tell some of the trails the family took over the ensuing years.
